### **Community Safety**

Colwinston is a safe and friendly village, a fact reinforced by the visit of our local PCSO, Angela Stone, to our September meeting. No crimes in Colwinston were reported over the summer, but residents have been asked to remain vigilant after a spate of thefts from vehicles in other Vale communities. Arrests have been made following the incidents in Ogmore-by-Sea, Rhoose and other rural towns and villages.

PCSO Stone also shone a light on the issue of lampers, who have been targeting farmland nearby. If you have intruders on your land at night you should call 999, do not approach them. If possible, try to note vehicle registrations, the number of people involved and whether they have lurchers or other dogs with them.

Concerning activity can also be reported at any time to the non-emergency 101 number.

### Village Maintenance

While the Vale of Glamorgan Council has cut some grass verges recently, they do not appear to have attended to all the expected areas and discussion is ongoing to ensure there are no cut-backs to the cutting back!

Trees are due to be pruned on Little Hill (the steps which descend from the side of the Sycamore Tree) and will be funded by your community council, while we have also agreed to fund fence posts for the Old Ford project team.

### Sign Language

You will have noticed that the road sign welcoming visitors to Colwinston from the A48 Crack Hill route disappeared some time ago. After much back-and-forth with the council, we've decided to fund a new sign ourselves. Soon, visitors will once again know exactly where they are – and that they're very welcome!

Residents are reminded to utilise the Greenlinks service. Leaflets have been distributed around the village and are available at the pub to explain how this community transport service can be booked.

#### **Remembrance Service**
